Queensland Men's Shed Association AGM

Recently, I attended the Queensland Men's Shed Association AGM — a well-supported gathering with Sheds represented from across the state. One highlight was the introduction of a new award for the best Shed magazine. This year's winner was the Mount Gravatt Men's Shed, and in his acceptance speech, their editor Wayne kindly acknowledged our own publication [B A D Shed Chatter] as a source of inspiration. A compliment well earned.

It's clear that the Men's Shed name and logo continue to grow in reputation, not only locally but internationally. Each year, Choice Magazine names Australia's most trusted brands — Bunnings, Arnott's, and others to name a few. I believe it won't be long before the Men's Shed movement earns similar recognition for trust and community value.

Men and Boys in Today's Society

It's becoming increasingly evident that men and boys are being left behind in areas such as education, employment, and public policy. What began as a necessary correction has tipped into imbalance, leaving many young men struggling with identity, opportunity, and mental health.

Male teachers, once vital role models are at historic lows. Women now graduate from university at significantly higher rates. Combined with the rise of fatherlessness, boys are growing up with fewer mentors during their most formative years.

At the same time, popular culture often labels masculinity as "toxic," attaching shame to traits like competitiveness, stoicism, and physical courage — qualities that once helped build communities. Advertising and government messaging frequently single out men for criticism, painting them disproportionately as problems rather than contributors.

This is precisely where the Men's Shed movement steps in. We fill a gap that is widening every year, offering connection, purpose, and mateship.

Men's Drop-In Night

Our Men's Drop-In Night has been paused over the Christmas/New Year period — not due to lack of interest, but simply because I've been stretched elsewhere. I've also been in discussions with **The Men's Table**. This is a charity similar to us that tries to build communities of men who meet monthly to share life stories openly. They are non judgemental while offering support to one another. With over 270 Tables across Australia, their brand is also growing.

My hope is to relaunch our Drop-In Night in a refreshed format in February 2026.

Remembering Dave Smallbone

Although Dave's passing was noted in our previous newsletter, this is my first opportunity to reflect on his contribution. Dave joined us in 2016 and quickly became one of our "old brigade." He loved the Shed — what it stood for, and how it brought men together as mates.

He knew his time was short, and he was determined to see Shed 4 built before he passed. It is a deep regret that I couldn't achieve this with him and for him.

But it will happen.

Christmas Raffle – Tickets were sold across the community.

Community Projects – Deception Bay State School was pleased with its new picket fence.

Thoughts

International Men's Day – November 19th passed quietly, overshadowed by World Toilet Day. Unlike International Women's Day, which receives strong recognition, International Men's Day barely raised a whisper.

Security & Missing Items – Despite having cameras, items still go missing. A simple reminder: if you take something, put it back.





Wayne from Men's Table.



Kyle picture frame.




Table by Lood.
